#### Connect:

Have each person share a high and low from this past week.

## Consider:

The trial represents the moment that Jesus was unjustly condemned so that we could be ultimately forgiven.

Choose one or two questions for your group to discuss as time allows.

- When you see some kind of injustice, do you lean more toward anger, sadness, or some other emotion?
- ► Read Mark 14:48—50. Where could the disciples have went? What might they have been thinking when Jesus was arrested?
- ▶ Read Mark 15: 1—5.
  - What are some alternative ways Jesus could have reacted?
  - What kept him from responding in a different way?
  - What can we learn from Jesus' silence and response?
- Which line does the world need most in this season?
  - Because he was abandoned, God is with us.
  - Because he was falsely accused, God defends us.
  - Because he was brutally abused, God heals us.
  - Because he was unjustly condemned, God forgives us.

# **Commit:**

Spend 1-2 minutes in silence with these questions then share your thoughts.

Read Isaiah 53:3-8. Which part of what Jesus went through amazes you most at this time in your life?

Take a moment and thank God for the amazing plan of salvation.
